FOOD FOR THOUGHT (Exercise is Logic):

Suppose there are twin brothers, one of whom always lies while the other always tells the truth. The truth-teller is also totally accurate in all his beliefs; all true propositions he knows to be true and all false propositions he knows to be false. The lying brother is totally inaccurate in his judgments; all true propositions he believes to be false, and all false propositions he believes to be true.

The interesting thing is that each brother will give the same answer to the same question. For example, suppose you ask whether two plus two is equal to four. The accurate truth-teller knows that it is, and will truthfully answer yes. The inaccurate liar will believe that two plus two doesn't equal four (since he is inaccurate) and will then lie and say that it does; he will also answer yes.

Suppose one were to meet one of the two brothers alone. Is it possible, by asking him yes/no questions, to find out which one he is - the accurate truth-teller or the inaccurate liar? Two logicians disagreed. The first said it is not possible because whatever the answers, the other brother would have given the same answers. The second logician claimed it is possible to find out. The second logician was right.

One question is enough. (Ask only one.) Just ask the brother whether he is the accurate truth-teller. If he is, he will know that he is (since he is always accurate) and truthfully answer yes. If he is the inaccurate liar, he will believe that he is the accurate truth-teller (since he is inaccurate in his beliefs), but then he will lie and say no. This regular meeting of the T-M Rotary Club was called to order by President Sigmund. As previously announced, the meeting was designated as a Business Meeting. An encapsulated summary of actions and discussions included the following:

1. The president discussed increasing the quarterly dues which are presently \$60. Current meal costs are \$4.25. No decision was made and the subject was carried over to the next meeting.
2. The treasurer reported \$2950 in the checking account and \$2056 in the savings account.
3. Harry Thompto gave the T-M Rotary Foundation report. There is \$25,000 invested, plus \$6,000 in checking to cover gifts, scholarship (discontinued), Boy Scouts, Little League, M-T Library, etc.
4. Motion by T. Egelhoff, seconded by K. Naggs, to pay \$100 toward P. Phelps attending R.I. annual meeting, and to pay registration fees for members at District conferences. Motion carried.
5. Motion by J. Vanderspool, seconded, that the club pay \$380 plus tax for Youth Traffic Light Training Program sponsored by City of Mequon and Village of Thiensville. Motion carried.
6. Motion by Dr. Witte, and seconded, that the club give \$25 to the Readin', Ritin', and Reboundin' program. Motion carried.
7. Dr. Elbe explained the Senior Active Membership Classification. A member automatically becomes Senior Active when he has:
 - (a) Fifteen years as a member.
 - (b) Ten years as a member and is 60 years old.
 - (c) Five years as a member and is 65 years old.
 - (d) Is an officer of Rotary International.
