PROGRAM:

Rotarian Aaron Starobin, on the board of Family Services of Mequon, introduced Terry Peckerman-Stein, the director. She explained a little about the history of the organization, and emphasized that its purpose is to expressly meet the needs of Mequon-Thiensville. In 1982 the service aided 389 persons. The main target is youth, which involves problems of family communication, depression, drug and alcohol abuse, etc. The organization does short-term crisis intervention. They also conduct "rap" sessions at Homestead High School. Two new programs are: (1) Preventing sexual abuse of children, and (2) Services for senior citizens, including volunteer help such as high school students. Their budget this year is \$32,000 with funding from several sources.

PROGRAM:

CURRENT CONCERNS:

1. A high priority is improvement of the business district of Thiensville in all aspects. This should develop incentive for new business to locate and old business to stay.
2. The 1983 budget is up 6% over 1982, mainly due to debt retirement.
3. The equalized valuation of the Village dropped \$1,000,000 from 1981 to 1982. This needs to be brought back up.
4. Plans call for a lot of road improvement in the near future.
5. Plans are afoot to solve the village sewer situation, with emphasis on an independent system (rather than metropolitan) which should be cheaper.

FUTURE CONCERNS:

1. In 1985 Thiensville will celebrate its 75th anniversary of incorporation as a village.
2. Officials are working to improve relationships between Thiensville and Mequon.
3. A review of zoning and subdivision codes will be done.
4. Consideration on developing a new park is coming.
5. The Village will be developing a new seal and flag.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. President Sigmund and Committee Chairman, George Witte, thanked the thirty Rotarians who helped make the National Honor Society Banquet a huge success. 2. The District Golf Tournament will be on June 30 at the South Hills Country Club near Racine. Racine West is the host club. Chairman of the event for the T-M Rotary Club is Ray Reuter.
2. Our sister Rotary club in Kenya, Africa, has sent President Sigmund a lengthy communication, listing a number of accomplishments achieved by the Kenya club in its 20-year existence. They are extensive. Because of the political and military instability in Kenya, the club membership has declined from 110 members to about 40 as members have been forced to move elsewhere. The T-M bulletin editor was asked to draft a reply to the letter.

PROGRAM:

Program chairman, Sandy Custer, introduced Don Schwarz, Regional Director of the Northern Region of MATC. The North Campus is on Highland Road in Mequon. Don gave some background information about the MATC district. The vocational-technical system is one of three state educational systems; the others being the elementary-secondary system and the university system. All states have a vocational-technical system, but they are organized in a variety of ways; and in some states the voc-tech system is of lesser status and importance. Our district consists of Milwaukee and Ozaukee counties plus Germantown in Washington County. Our North Campus region includes Ozaukee County and the northern part of Milwaukee County, and also includes Germantown. It especially focuses on programs in general business and agri-business, being the only campus to offer agri-business. North Campus enrollment is up 105% over three years ago, providing instruction for 3500 students, plus that many more in the various public school centers. During the past few years, they have: (1) increased program offerings, (2) increased staffing efficiency, (3) taken leadership in computer training, and (4) provided extensive contract training programs for business and industry. A good program of local interest.
