PROGRAM:

Don Roensch, Mequon City Administrator, brought us up-to- date on things we ought to know about:

1. Mequon Road is scheduled to re-open about mid-November, with appropriate ceremonies.
2. Wauwatosa Road (2 miles to the county line) is the next project to move to the front burner. Scheduled for 1987???
3. Nothing definite on RVS cable television developments. The company has been acquired by Sentry Communications. Wait and see!
4. The Solar Heights sewer project should be started by early 1984. Financing still to be decided (should everyone or part be taxed?)
5. The Metropolitan Sewer District controversy continues. Should property valuation, or usage, be the basis for paying the costs.
6. The Mequon swimming pool renovation is in full swing.
7. The Buntrock Memorial statue is to be installed on October 29.
8. Plans are being considered for construction of a 1.7 million dollar safety building (police and fire departments).
9. Budget preparation is now in progress. State revenues are dropping and tax base may increase only 1½%. Capital budget items to be addressed are:
 - (a) Waste management (the dump will close in May).
 - (b) Streets and equipment must be maintained and replaced.
 - (c) Mequon water supply must be studied. A test well will be drilled near Lake Michigan.

WHAT IS ROTARY DOING?

Members of the Rotary Club of Bombay, Northwest, Maharashtra, India, "adopted" a poor farmer and provided him with modern farming implements to increase his rice crop. They also hired an expert on rice cultivation to guide him. His yield was doubled. Twenty other farmers were similarly trained with the club's help. The Rotary Club of Dar-es-Salaam, Tanzania, is currently distributing among Tanzanian schools more than 90,000 copies of a Swahili edition of a simple health care manual, Where There Is No Doctor, (Mahile Pasipo Na Daktari).
