Each active member shall be an adult male person of good character and good business or professional reputation engaged as proprietor, partner, corporate officer, or manager, of any worthy and recognized business or profession; or holding an important position in an executive capacity with discretionary authority in any worthy and recognized business or profession; or acting as the local agent or branch representative of any worthy and recognized business or profession, having entire charge of such agency or branch in an executive capacity; and personally and actively engaged in the business or profession in which he is classified in the club and having his place of business or residence located therein.

So, program chairman, "Deadline Dick", dug up a delightful substitute in Gail Dillon, Family Services of Mequon, who explained one facet of the program; namely, the senior citizen program. She discussed two aspects of the senior program: (1) Volunteer services to provide assistance for chores, shopping, transportation, etc., and (2) the reassurance program consisting of daily calls to senior citizens for check-up purposes, socialization, information, etc. Over 70 volunteers are involved in this project; many of them are high school students. It is a pilot program but growing rapidly, especially via word-of-mouth dissemination about it. It is innovative enough to get some United Way funding.

MORE ABOUT ROTARY:

26. Which committee is responsible for proposing new members?
Although all Rotarians share the responsibility for proposing new members, the membership development committee has the specific job of reviewing the roster of classifications and proposing men for unfilled classifications.
27. How may an active member lose his membership in a Rotary Club?
Active membership is terminated automatically when one ceases to be personally engaged in the classification of business or profession under which he is classified or ceases to have his place of business or residence within the territorial limits of the club. Or, (1) by severing his connections with his business establishment (even if his kind of business remains the same), (2) for cause, (3) by non-payment of dues to the club, (4) for failure to comply with attendance requirements, and (5) by resignation.
