PROGRAM:

Price Davis, a member of the Milwaukee Downtown Rotary Club, described the Second Harvesters of Wisconsin, which is one of their projects. It is a cooperative venture of business, community and service agencies to salvage and distribute food to the hungry. A national network program of 63 food banks, Milwaukee is the only one in Wisconsin. Second Harvesters, acting as a wholesaler, has its Milwaukee warehouse, office and distribution equipment, and distributes acceptable surplus and unsaleable foodstuffs to accredited 501 (c) (3) non-profit agencies which serve meals or distribute food to the needy at no charge for the food. About 400,000 lbs. of food is distributed each month. The food is donated from manufacturers, farmers, bakeries, wholesalers, and retailers; and consists of such things as partial cases, undersized products, improperly coded cans, overproduction, etc. This operation won the District #627 project of the year award in 1983.

Yes, in Sao Paulo, Brazil; Stockholm, Sweden; Sydney, Australia; Tokyo, Japan; and Zurich, Switzerland. Headquarters of Rotary International in Britain' and Ireland serves the clubs in Great Britain and Ireland.

MORE ABOUT ROTARY:

37. What is the classification principle of membership?

That active membership in a club shall consist of but one man in each classification of business or profession excepting religion, news media, and diplomatic service classifications and excepting the provisions for additional active members.

38. Why does Rotary limit membership in a club to but one man from each classification (with above exceptions)?

These are the principle reasons: 1) It enables the club to be a true cross-section of the industrial and professional life of the community, and prevents the club from being dominated by any one group; 2) It develops fellowship based on diversity of interest instead of similarity of interest.

MORE ABOUT ROTARY:

39. If a Rotarian moves from one city to another, and his classification is unfilled in the club in the adopted city, may he have his membership transferred to that club?

No, he must again be properly proposed and regularly elected.

40. How may a Rotarian protect his membership if obliged to miss meetings of his club?

By make-up at meetings of other Rotary Clubs at any time between the usual time of the regular meeting of his club immediately preceding the day of absence and the usual time of the regular meeting of his club immediately following the day of absence. If for good and sufficient reason he must miss more than three consecutive meetings of his club, and cannot attend another club during that time, he may be excused by the board of directors. He will not receive attendance credit.

41. The Constitution provides that membership is terminated automatically if attendance falls below 60 per cent during the first or second six months of the fiscal year. Must a Rotarian attend 60 per cent of the meetings of his own club to retain membership?

No, obviously a Rotarian should make every effort to attend the meetings of his own club. Otherwise he cannot take an active part in its program and neither he nor the club will benefit. His attendance record is calculated on the basis of total attendance of his own club and at other clubs where he has "made-up". However, at least 30 per cent of his attendance during each half year must be at his home club, unless exempted by the board of directors of his club.
