### ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. May 15 is the date for the National Honor Society Banquet at Homestead High School. This event is sponsored by 1-M Rotary and all Rotarians are expected to be present to help with the serving, ceremonies, clean-up and other miscellaneous chores. This is considered a regular meeting with committee members to be on duty at 5:30 P.M., and the general membership to report at 6:00 P.M.
2. June 26 is the Changing of the Guard meeting. It is an evening meeting and will include Rotary Anns. Keep your calendar open.
3. T-M Rotary Club ranked 29th (out of 52 clubs) in attendance for the month of March. The officers and directors look for improvement.
4. The Antrim Rotary Club from Northern Ireland sent us a letter expressing their concern about the unfavorable portrayal of their country by the world news media. They say things aren't that bad.

### PROGRAM: ~

Norbert Kurshewski, private investigator, talked to the club about his line of work. His agency is located in Shorewood and consists of 10 employees (all licensed). The laws of Wisconsin are very strict concerning private investigator activities and the agencies also police their own ranks. His agency handles criminal work, child custody cases, insurance fraud, etc. Some comments:

1. Unlike TV private eyes, he has never been beaten up or shot at.
2. He worked on the Hillside Strangler case (Los Angeles) for seven months and interviewed about 200 people.
3. He has been on the Michelle Manders case (Watertown) and the Hack and Drew murders in Jefferson County.
4. You can get a lot of information about people by talking with neighbors.
5. Some of his cases involve cults, murder and rape. Wisconsin is sixth in the nation in amount of witchcraft activity. There are 300 registered witches between Milwaukee and Madison (registered with the State of Wisconsin).
6. At least 50% of all crimes are drug related. More and more, the trend is toward an increase in drug related crime.
7. In the last 10 years there have been nine cult murders in Jefferson County, all in October. He thinks he is close to nailing them. Satanist cults are involved with sacrifices, drinking blood, etc. This involves use of animals, then children and sometimes adults.
