Other 3-H projects help build schools, community centers, aid in producing and marketing of products, training for employable skills, food production, etc.

PROGRAM:

Ed Bradley, Director of Planning for St. Alphonsus Hospital, briefed the club on future plans for St. Alphonsus. The planning actually started back in 1979-80. Several options have been studied, including 1) remodeling and renovating the present hospital, and 2) designing and building a brand new facility. The advantages point to the building of a new structure for only \$3 - 5 million more than the remodeling project. Then comes the question of location. After studying projected growth patterns of Ozaukee County it was decided to relocate to the Cedarburg-Grafton area, with several sites under consideration. New trends such as walk-in clinics and home care have to be considered in the plans and location. There are no plans to duplicate specialties such as heart surgery. It will be three to five years before the doors of the new hospital will be opened.
