PROGRAM:

Tom Stacey of the Drug Enforcement Agency spoke to the club about some of his activities and duties. After several years in the Milwaukee area, he is being transferred to Ecuador, by choice. He has recently been involved in the much-publicized Tony Peters investigation. Giving us the "cold facts" on what we are looking at in the Milwaukee area, he made the following points: 1) Our drug problems are about the same as other cities such as Chicago, New York, etc.; 2) In our area and elsewhere, by far the drug of choice today is cocaine; 3) The amounts of money involved are so great the traffickers have trouble disposing of it. The Peters operation handled over \$19,000,000 a year; 4) A truckload of cocaine would not last two hours in T-M or other similar community; 5) Price of cocaine is down now because so many dealers are in it and there is a glut on the market; 6) There is enough cocaine stored in Dade Co., Florida, alone to satisfy the U.S. public for five years; 7) Cocaine now frightens authorities more than heroin because it permeates all levels of society, including congressmen, doctors, lawyers, law officers, teachers; 8) Cocaine is an addictive drug, resulting in a bigger psychological hook than any other drug; 9) Marijuana is in the background, publicity-wise, but it is here just the same; 10) Much marijuana is now grown in the U.S. A hybrid plant has been developed that is more potent. One plant can produce about \$5000 worth. It is grown among corn and other cultivated plants as well as hidden places. Many of the places are "booby-trapped" and dangerous to law enforcement people; 11) White heroin is coming back on the East coast. This is Asian heroin and sells for \$10,000 per ounce; 12) LSD is making a comeback, especially in the Fox River Valley area; 13) Law enforcement approach now is to target the big operators (like Peters). Using the CCE law, sentences are 10 years to life with no probation and all assets can be seized and confiscated. An interesting, but scary program.

PROGRAM:

Dr. Robert Teplin presented an intriguing and illustrative program on laser surgery, particularly as it applied to carcinoma of the larynx and throat. LASER is an acronym for Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation. Dr. Teplin explained what it is and how it works. It is a beam of light (energy) which falls within the infra-red range of wave frequencies, with amplitude modulated to make it manageable. The beam is very thin but very high in energy.

Dr. Teplin showed a video-tape illustrating the equipment, how used, techniques, etc. The tape is used in medical schools, hospitals, etc., as well as for presentation to lay groups. Much of the tape showed surgery on actual patients, using the laser-beam technique. A fascinating program!
