President Carlos Canseco challenges the Rotary world with a goal of 1,000,000 Rotarians by December 31, 1984. To meet that goal a net gain of 47,250 is needed by December 31. That figures out to an average net gain of 2.27 members per club.

DID YOU KNOW?

As this issue goes to press, there are 20,879 Rotary clubs with a membership of 953,500 in 159 countries and geographical regions. Since July 1, 1984, there have been 1068 Paul Harris Fellows, with a present grand total of 108,577 Paul Harris Fellows.

WOMEN MEMBERSHIP IN SERVICE CLUBS:

On July 3, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the U.S. Junior Chambers of Commerce organization can be required under the laws of some states to accept women as members. R.I. President Carlos Canseco has commented on the decision:

"It is my view that, because Rotary is an organization with the sole purpose of service to others, the issues decided by the Supreme Court in Roberts vs. United States Jaycees are outside the scope of and therefore do not affect the membership policies of Rotary International."

He noted several important differences between Rotary's purpose and procedures and those of the Jaycees:

1. Rotary's purpose is entirely to serve others. Members themselves derive no services from membership;
2. Rotary is not a business organization, and has no commercial purpose;
3. Rotary's selective membership provisions are carefully observed and enforced. Membership is by invitation only.

"In summary", said President Carlos, "Rotary is a men's fellowship whose purpose is service. It is not a business or public accommodation. By policy, it is not political. Rotary prohibits a member from seeking any business or professional advantage from membership."

The Supreme Court decision requires no change in Rotary's membership rules and, accordingly, none are authorized.

PROGRAM:

Karl Hertz, one of our newest members, accepted a last minute emergency call as speaker of the day. Starting with education in general, Karl emphasized that this is a period of high interest in education as evidenced by the numerous reports and studies of the past few years. Most of the reports are preponderantly negative. Good schools do make a difference. Schools are expected to do many things (drug control, nutrition, recreation, vandalism control, racial integration, etc.). Schools are not experts in all of these areas of expectation; but one thing they are expert at is teaching students to read, write, figure, compute, etc. The U.S. is unique in that it attempts to educate every one. Most countries are selective in who is educated. Communities that have high expectations for their school systems also have good schools.

Getting down to local concerns, Karl discussed the tax levy; the integration lawsuit started by the Milwaukee School Board (advised by attorneys not to say much); legislative proposals to reorganize all districts in the state, or just city of Milwaukee, or just county of Milwaukee; the Metropolitan Study Group on school quality, etc. A good program by one of our own.
