PROGRAM: Frank Adkins, Boy Scouts of America, talked to the club about Boy Scouts. 1985 marks 75 years of Scouting. In those 75 years, 7,000,000 scouts have gone through the program. Further statistics: 1) 25% of eligibles are in scouting, 2) 65% of all college grads were scouts, 3) 75% of military academy students were scouts, and 4) two out of three Rhodes Scholars were in scouting.

Scouting is there to build character. T-M Rotary has supported scouting for years. We are in the Bay Lakes Council which contains 28,000 scouts and operates on a budget of \$1,308,655 this year. T-M Rotary Club was presented with a plaque for our support (\$500 this past year).

PROGRAM: Dr. Dale Brock, UW-Whitewater and Director of the World Affairs Seminar, talked to the club about the Seminar program, history and objectives. June 9 - 14 will be the ninth year of the seminar, which was Dr. Brock's idea nine years ago. In 1977 (first year) there were 148 students in attendance. This year, 1985, they are expecting over 800 students. It is held at UW-Whitewater. Format for the program starts with a Sunday evening program and then a different topic for each of the next five days. Students stay in university dorms. Speakers come from the U.S. State Department, the Pentagon, political science departments, etc. Group discussions follow the speeches.

One-fifth of the students are foreign exchange students, and 53 countries were represented last year. They try to present all sides of any topic, and then follow up in like manner in the discussion groups. A little controversy arose in the district a few years ago when a student speaking to his local Rotary Club presented only one side of the discussions.
