PROGRAM:

Steve Davis, from the Washington-Ozaukee Social Security Office, gave us an overview of the social security program, with special emphasis on recent changes in the program. 1986 has brought an increase in the social security tax rate, as well as an increase in the wage and salary base on which the rate is applied. This double whammy is a part of recent changes to keep the fund solvent into the 21st century. Interestingly, we were told that 98.7% of collected funds are paid out to recipients and only 1.3% is needed for administration expenses. Other changes discussed were: 1) Amounts that can be earned by recipients before benefits are withheld or reduced; 2) The taxation of benefits for those recipients who have gross incomes above \$25,000 (single) or \$32,000 (joint); 3) Cost of living increases for 1986; and 4) Medicare changes and the HMO concept.

Numerous questions were asked since about half the club exhibited keen interest in the subject. It was good information for the aging and the aged.
