PROGRAM:

Mary Anderson, Curriculum Coordinator for the M-T School District, was the speaker. She did her undergraduate study at Purdue and received her graduate degrees from Indiana University. Her topic was, "A Progress Report on the M-T Schools".

Starting with Homestead High School, Ms. Anderson indicated that about 85% of the graduates went on to further education. There were two National Merit Scholars last year.. Homestead operates as a comprehensive high school, meeting the needs of all students; and tries to obtain feedback from graduates on how well the school met their needs and prepared them for their next endeavors. She talked about the advanced placement program and honors classes; and then described the K-12 writing program which includes the high school writing lab which has received national attention.

The middle schools as a bridge between elementary grades and high school was discussed, as well as the formalized reading program from kindergarten through 8th grade. The K-12 computer instruction program was discussed, and the new K-8 science curriculum was mentioned. She explained the six-year cycle during which each year was devoted to a particular curriculum area, and also talked about improvement of instruction through teacher recruitment, staff development and evaluation.

Mary entertained us with two "Hoosier" stories and also provided an outlet whereby two "old timers" were given an opportunity to reminisce for some time. Time ran out before Walker could get into it.
