No staff increases are contemplated. His goal is to spend 80% of the effort and resources to retain Wis. business and 20% for procurement of new business and jobs. He hopes to secure more federal business and contracts (Wis. is now 49th). The governor wants to put more funds into promotion of tourism. As a general policy he hopes to present a clear set of goals, and present a cooperative rather confrontational approach.

PROGRAM: Don Hanaway, Attorney General for the State of Wisconsin, was the guest speaker. He is a Wisconsin native with a law degree from UW-Madison. He has been mayor of De Pere and also a state senator. Mr. Hanaway pointed out that the State Justice System probably affected more people than any other state department. At any given time there are 1000-1200 cases in court, all of which must be covered by the Dept. of Justice. There are 95 attorneys, plus additional staff, to cover these cases. Total department budget is \$30,000,000 a year. Hanaway talked at some length about crime, prevention, and gambling. Crime is a problem for which everybody pays: families, friends, elderly, general public, etc. The cost in Wis., with all its ramifications, is over a billion dollars a year. He is concerned about crime prevention and wants Wis. to be as crime-free as possible. Hanaway is opposed to a lottery and pari-mutual betting in Wis. He stated that it (1) would lead to an increase in crime, (2) would make the state a partner in the gambling business if the state legalizes it, and (3) would probably require 200 more state employees at least. Three reporters were present to cover the speech and a lengthy article appeared in the March 25 Milwaukee Journal about the Hanaway talk to the "Thiensville Rotary Club."

**PROGRAM:** Fred Luber, CEO of Super Steel Products, who was very active in Governor Tompson's campaign, was the guest speaker. He pointed out that we should become more active in the political arena in Wis. We are now operating in a world economy, competing for world markets where the prices of materials are about the same. The two variables in the competition are labor and the effects of government, and labor is not the problem that it is said to be. The effects of government are probably the most significant variables. We need to create wealth, not just redistribute it as government is prone to do. Therefore we must become politically involved to see that this creation of wealth takes place. Business, education, labor, and government must work together. The state goal is to make Wis. competitive by 1992, but we will have to cut spending to do it. Other topics discussed were the state pension fund and mandatory arbitration.

**ATTENDANCE:** T-M Rotary ranked 6th in the district for February, averaging 94 percent. We also rank 6th in year-to-date statistics. Four clubs have had a 100 percent month, the closest being Slinger-Allenton.

### **POLIOPLUS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS:**

Q. What is the difference between Salk and Sabin vaccines?

A. The Salk vaccine is a killed polio virus administered by intramuscular injection. It confers immunity through antibodies raised in the bloodstream. The Sabin vaccine, given orally, is a live attenuated (weakened) polio virus that raises antibodies in both the blood and the intestines. The World Health Organization recommends the Sabin vaccines for use in both developed and developing countries because of its ease of administration, lower cost, and wider acceptance. Its major drawback is that, in rare cases, it may actually cause polio in the recipient. Rotary will respect the desires of the individual countries. Most requests to date have been for the Sabin vaccines.
