Major expenses for 1987-88 include: (1) \$8,000 for the District Conference to cover costs not charged to attendees, (2) \$7,000 for liability insurance for District officers and individual clubs, (3) \$6,300 for Youth Exchange Program, (4) \$12,000 for World Affairs Seminar, (5) \$7,000 for the Group Exchange, (6) \$6,250 for expenses of the DG and DGN, (7) \$2,750 for printing district directory, (8) \$4,000 for start-up costs for new District Youth Festival of the Performing Arts.
