PROGRAM:

Rick Hart, associated with St. Michael Hospital, discussed the changing health care scene. Among the trends he cited were: (1) a movement away from small hospitals to larger corporate type organizations; (2) the continued role played by the federal government because of concern about Medicare and Medicaid; (3) local business and industry involvement with health care changes on the local scene; and (4) the increasing competition among the providers of health care.

Looking ahead, Hart predicted, (1) increase in the care provided by HMO's and similar care systems; (2) domination by the large care systems; (3) integration of various levels of care; (4) a larger role for the insurance industry in health care; (5) a decline in demand for hospital care in favor of alternates; (6) the physician will have less and less to say about providing health care; (7) more accountability will be required from hospitals; and (8) some tough moral and ethical dilemmas will have to be faced in health care provision.
