### PROGRAM:

After opening comments and remarks from John Riley, David Hoogerland, a member of the AFS Board, introduced the two AFS students who were to present the program. Hoogerland described his own involvement in AFS activities as well as Homestead's involvement in AFS. There are four AFS students at Homestead this year, plus several Homestead students studying abroad.

The first student speaker was Frank Hemm, from Switzerland. Having no problem with English, he narrated a slide series on his homeland. Switzerland, with a population of 6 million people, has four language speaking areas; namely, German, French, Italian, and Romance. Frank is from a German speaking city of 80,000 located on Lake Constance, near the German and Austrian borders. His slides portrayed Switzerland in general, showing modes of transportation, industries, banks, commerce, etc. He also presented slides of his hometown, with pictures of buildings, shopping areas, institutions, and the host family members.

The second student, Eric Riley (son of John), is a Homestead student who spent a year over in Johannesburg, South Africa. Eric showed slides of the city, the countryside, the bush, villages, etc. These also included his host family and friends, as well as troops, weapons, and a general martial atmosphere. Some interesting slides suggested voodoo or witchcraft practices. Others were pictures of things which signs warned should not be photographed.

PROGRAM:

John Wiley, an Oshkosh Rotarian, described the Haiti Well project sponsored by Rotary. He pointed out that this was one of many Rotary projects contributing to world understanding and peace. Rotary sponsors the largest Youth Exchange program in the world. Rotary Foundation is the 16th largest foundation in the world. The Haiti project will build 50 wells in a 100 square mile area. Some hospitals do not have a well. People walk 10 miles to get clean water; many do not do it and as a consequence they get sick from contaminated water. Hartford Rotary is sending a complete field hospital to Haiti. Rotary does not have to worry about politics,, religion, etc. They work with other clubs and people. For the past two years our district has been raising money for the Haiti project. We now have \$33,400 with \$3,0000 still needed. These wells are being built to last., It was pointed out that we can do something more than pay our taxes and work through our church. There are many projects that could be started if someone would get at it.
