PROGRAM:

Robert Jacobs introduced his son-in-law, Nadan Cassuto, a native-born citizen and resident of Israel, who gave us an overview of the mideast situation from the Israeli viewpoint. Nadan has his bachelor's degree in psychology, and is pursuing graduate study on his MA and PhD.

He reminded us that events as we see them on TV and in the printed media are only a partial story. We miss what preceded the confrontations and also what followed. According to him the events are distorted by the media. Having served in the Israeli army, he talked about the sanctity of life and the difficulty for Israeli soldiers to shoot anyone.

He then showed us a film, starting with the UN proposal for a State of Israel in 1947. This was the partition of Palestine into Israel and Arab countries, a proposal supported by the US but not accepted by the Arabs. As soon as the British pulled out, the Arabs invaded the new State of Israel (the 1948 war) and were defeated. In 1967 Israel was invaded again and acquired the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. The PLO refuses to recognize Israel as a state, saying they have no right to exist.

Nadan then talked about the PLO leaders and their Russian support, terrorist activities, etc.; as well as the political situation in Israel. He entertained questions following the presentation.
