PROGRAM: Dick Johannes introduced Gil Boese, Director of the Milwaukee County Zoo, who talked about the past, present, and future of the zoo. In 1980 zoo attendance was about one million; by 1987 it was 1.7 million. In 1980 it was 75% tax supported and one of the goals was to increase revenues from attendance and private sources, which has been done. Another goal was to weave the zoo into the fabric of the community, and now there are many volunteers. There are always 6-10 volunteer projects going on. Private support is now up to \$2,000,000. Future goals are to increase private support and decrease public support. Currently there are 5,000 specimens in the zoo; only 4 other zoos exceed that. Future plans are to expand the season to year-round activities and increase attendance another 700,000. The zoo is on a roll and we can help by visiting, and joining the Zoological Society.

PROGRAM:

Loyal Wells introduced the speaker, A. J. Amato, President and Chief Executive Officer of Forward Wisconsin, Inc., the state's economic development marketing corporation. This unique public-private partnership, which matches private sector funds with state taxpayer dollars, has put the state on the cutting edge of economic development. Governor Tommy Thompson is Chairman of Forward's Board of Directors, whose members include representatives from business, labor, utilities, financial institutions, and public institutions. Amato mentioned his recent trip to New Zealand and the economic growth there following a drastic deregulation process. Forward Wisconsin was created in 1984 by the Wisconsin Legislature, to work with business and industry. Other states have been spending much more on economic development but Wisconsin is catching up. Emphasis is placed: First, on retaining current businesses; secondly, on promoting home-grown business; and, thirdly, on attracting business and industry from outside. Amato discussed the tough competition in attracting outside business. He then discussed public-private cooperation, Wisconsin assets and weaknesses, diversification, target industries. Forward Wisconsin is here to help.
