TUESDAY, May 2, 1989 - Boder's-on-the-River

ANNOUNCEMENTS, NEWS AND NOTES:

1. Karl Hertz, presiding, reported that nine T-M Rotarians attended the District Conference at The Abbey. Fourteen people showed up for the "Hertz President-Elect" breakfast at a cost less than \$40.
2. Members were reminded of the National Honor Society Banquet (Rotary sponsored) at Homestead on Monday, May 15, with serving to start at 6:30 p.m. Rotarians will be needed for set up at 5:30 and will need to eat before 6:30.
3. The club received a "thank you" note from the Scouts for our contribution and Fish Fry support.

PROGRAM: Two NATO officers presented the program to brief Americans about the NATO alliance. They were Cmdr. Chris Hunt of Britain's Royal Navy and U.S. Navy Lt. Cmdr. Mike Labbe, a 1974 Marquette graduate. This marks the 40th year of NATO. Their discussion covered: (1) historical perspectives, (2) challenges and tensions, and (3) NATO initiatives. NATO was formed in 1949 to stop Soviet expansion in Europe. Later, Greece, Turkey, and Spain joined. Not one inch of NATO territory has been lost in 40 years. Headquarters is in Brussels. Both speakers pointed out the Soviet capabilities in terms of surface navy, submarine fleets, air threats, etc. They suggested that the Soviet stance at the present time was because Russia needs some time to get their own house in order. We were advised to keep our guard up, 'because things could change quickly. Our best approach is to maintain a credible deterrent by building adequate naval forces, having good contingency plans, modernize our forces, standardize with other NATO forces, etc. Understanding potential enemies and their capabilities: will enable us to be ready for any kind of early or necessary response. Many questions followed including those from a Milwaukee Journal reporter who covered the meeting.

NEW MEMBER INDUCTED: Kevin Perlberg was inducted into the club. President Starobin gave a short indoctrination talk covering the history of Rotary, purpose, organization, ideals, and philosophy, club activities, duties, and obligations. Welcome into the club, Kevin.

PROGRAM: Ray Reuter introduced James LaPinske, Postmaster of the Thiensville Post Office which also serves Mequon. He has been in the post office business for 33 years, and since 1983 he has been postmaster at Thiensville. LaPinske described his family, which moved here in 1984, and related how much they like our community. He then explained that the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970 took the U.S. Government out of direct control of post offices. The service is now under control of a board of governors, with no government subsidy any more. There is a Postal Rate Commission which reviews and sets rates. The postal service pays its own way. Labor contracts are negotiated at the federal level. A 1 cent increase per gallon of gas causes a 10 million dollar increase in postal costs over-all. Top management is headquartered in Washington, D.C. There are 47 employees in the Thiensville post office. Our local post office makes 8800 deliveries each day, and delivered over 21 million pieces of mail in 1988. Things start at the post office with sorting at 4:00 a.m. There are 23 delivery routes. Clerks are accountable for their own stock, and any shortages come out of their own pockets. They are subject to audits at least monthly. Carriers usually work four hours in the office and four hours on the route. The total postal service is going through an up-dating of its automation procedures.

MONEY! MONEY! MONEY! WHO HAS THE MONEY?

1. Bruce Curry, Mequon resident, addressed the club concerning Family Sharing of Ozaukee. It is a volunteer organization (72 volunteers). He says there is need in Ozaukee County for family help, including the "working poor" whose income is too low to support a family. Most needy just have to be tidied over until they get on their feet. Family Sharing distributed over \$350,000 worth of stuff in Ozaukee County last year. They have to vacate
2. their distribution quarters in Trinity Lutheran, Cedarburg, and Lindenwood School; so they are planning to build new quarters in the Industrial Park north of Grafton. They will need \$180,000 and they have \$85,000 now. They need help from Rotary clubs or from individual members.
3. Kristine Hinrichs presented an issue which had just come up. Thiensville needs new - brackets to display flags and Christmas decorations. They are asking three local service clubs (including Rotary) for \$800 each, and other secondary groups for smaller donations. It is not in our Rotary budget this year, but Kristine pointed out that we do not have to contribute to the parade this year.
4. John Riley introduced a young man from Laos, who will graduate from Marquette H.S. this year and will attend Northwestern next fall. The young lad needs \$600 to attend a special conference where participants will learn to improve themselves in spite of prejudice, show that minorities can succeed, and build up self esteem.
